

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Another strong year for NSW Country Rugby Union and I am always delighted when other members of the Rugby community comment on how well run and positive we are in running our great game.

It doesn't happen by accident, a lot of hard work from a lot of people out in the zones sees us have around 20,000 participants and 17,000 players involved in Rugby. The army of volunteers that make this happen is outstanding and their efforts are truly our major asset.

The Illawarra Warriors made it back to back Caldwell Cups when they defeated Newcastle Hunter in the Country Championships in Armidale. In the Colts Newcastle Hunter retained their title with a close win over the Central Coast, while Hunter had to overcome stiff opposition to retain their title in the Women's. Next year we are in Port Macquarie and are looking to add a Woman's Sevens competition, so watch out for that as we continue to grow this very important piece of the NSW Country Rugby landscape.

On the field the Cockatoos came very close to winning their three key games, only just going down to Queensland Country in the dying seconds of our game in Toowoomba. Great wins over NSW Subbies and Brumbies Provincial preceded this game, and the style of Rugby being played was certainly of a very high standard.

The Colts program was unfortunately derailed and apart from the Southern States Championships in Adelaide no other games could be scheduled. We are determined to rectify this in 2017, as Colts are the next generation and we want to ensure they have opportunities to progress.

The Corellas had an outstanding year, which saw them claim the Plate Shield at the National Championships for the second time in three years, while the selection of Sarah Riordan and Alana Paterson in the Wallaroos capped off the year. Also congratulations to Paul Verrell (Coach) and Amanda Ferguson (Manager) on their Wallaroo appointments.

I am also pleased that this year we had much stronger connection with the NSW Country Eagles, and I was fortunate to attend three of their matches this year. Again a great style of fast, physical and open Rugby was played and it's a delight to watch. The Eagles made it to the NRC Final, and whilst they came up against a red hot Perth outfit, they certainly did Country proud.

To my Board, thank you very much for your time, dedication and wise counsel. Getting across the nuances of what comes at us from NSWRU and ARU, together with keeping it all ticking over is no mean feat and we are very fortunate to have such skilled representatives. To Paul Verrell who is standing down from the Board, a big thank you for your contribution and support. Our best wishes to you and to the Wallaroos.

Finally, to Terry Woodward our Executive Officer. The amount of time and effort he puts in to ensure all the administration runs smoothly does not go unnoticed.

Balancing the match day manager role for the Waratahs and supporting the Zones, Juniors, Referees and Representative Programs is at times very demanding, yet he does it all and makes it look easy. He also got specifically called upon to assist the NSW Country Eagles with their match day management due to his skills at running these events and helped make those games run without incident. A big thank you to you, all you do is greatly appreciated.

Please enjoy the upcoming festive season with your loved ones, be safe and I look forward to kicking off a big 2017 and keeping NSW Country Rugby at the forefront of Rugby in NSW.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

2016 Season for NSW Country Rugby Union was again successful, but in order for this success to be achieved, the Union together with the Affiliates, Zones and Clubs had to overcome an ever increasing number of hurdles.

The ever increasing issue of finances, or for the want of better words, lack of finances, continues to be a major issue for everyone involved with Country Rugby, and Rugby in general.

Costs associated with the running of the Union, Affiliates, Zones and Clubs continue to increase, while the avenues for income, especially sponsorship, continues to become tighter and tighter. The lower you go down the Rugby food chain, the higher the costs seem to become, and this is really starting to become an issue, especially at club level.

The continued reduction in funding flowing from the National Union to State Unions, is starting to kick in, with the flow on effect resulting in funding being cut to those further down the funding chain. State Unions are now dependant on the National Participation Fee (NPF), a fee which was introduced by the National Union to overcome the shortfalls of funding in Australian Rugby. NPF solely goes to the State Unions to fund their respective Community Rugby Programs, which includes the Development Officers. NPF brings Rugby into line with other sports and is here to stay, and it's disappointing that some clubs haven't embraced the concept, and haven't accepted the need to include the NPF in their fee structures.

Even allowing for the above issues, the Affiliates and Zones continued to administer, promote and present the Game of Rugby across Rural and Regional New South Wales in the now customary professional manner. Each of the competitions were strongly

contested, with semi-final positions in the majority of competitions going right down to the final round of the regular season. Final series were by far the best on record, with crowds across the zones being very healthy, and in several instances, record breaking in total attendance, with in excess of 50,000 plus individuals supporting the nine zone final series. There were several milestones set in relation to breaking premiership droughts, maintaining reigns, reigns coming to an end and disappointment for some who came so close, but finished up not in the winner's circle.

Whilst the on-field performances were very positive and exciting, there were several off-field issues which saw the game in some zones brought into bad light, which was as a result of some clubs not wanting to abide by the rules and regulations. There has now developed a trend of some clubs thinking they are bigger than the Game, and when things don't go their way it's time to run to the media and lawyers at ten paces. Rules and regulations are there for a reason, and if they are adhered too and applied correctly, it's a simple process, but there are some clubs who think they are above this process. It was pleasing to see the support the ARU and NSWRU provided to NSWCRU and several zones, as a result of some clubs thinking they were bigger than the Game.

Whilst there were injuries sustained during the year, thankfully there were none of a severe nature as last year, but there are still some clubs who are allowing non-registered players to participate. This continues to be a major concern, and all zones need to adopt a zero tolerance in the handling and penalising of the offending clubs, as there will come a time when an insurance claim for an injured non-registered player will be declined.

I would again like to thank the Zone Administrators for their support throughout the season, which saw some subjected to abuse and pressuring as a result of them simply doing their jobs and applying rules and regulations. There has only been a few name changes from last year - Kate Thomson (CCRU), Tony Byrnes & David Rodgers (CNRU), Paul Ryan & Peter Veenstra (CWRU), Wayne Millane (FNCRU), Peter Leiner & Larissa McKellar (IDRU), Bob Wilson (MNCRU), Richard Croft (NERU), Andy Fairfull & Grahame Cowan (NHRU) and Vivian Slack-Smith (WPRU).

Our Affiliates continue to get the job done, with each group working in well with their respective zones, which contributed greatly to the successful Country season across the state. The Country Eagles under the new merged arrangements participated in the NRC with new zest, and only faltered at the last hurdle in their attempt to take out the title.

The finances reflect the Union as being in a healthy state, but the final modest negative result was achieved on the back of the cards falling the way of the Union in some areas. A \$50K loss in overall sponsorship came at a very bad time for the Union, but a strong budget and ongoing monitoring throughout the year achieved the result. The cancellation of the latter part of the Colts program curtailed spending, while the on and off field kit earmarked for the Colts is held in stock and will be utilised next year. NSW Rugby Union and the Waratahs continue to be the Unions major financial supporters, and I again thank each organisation, but they too are feeling the pinch, and their support could be reduced moving forward. On a positive

note the Union was able to meet all their financial obligations, and at the same time maintain funding levels to the affiliates.

Our "Family of Sponsors" has dwindled following the loss of The National Roads & Motorists' Association, QantasLink and Ruffie, but AGL, Classic Sportswear, Best Western Australasia, Beiersdorf, Gilbert Footballs, International Sports Tours, The Rugby Club and Balanced Image Studio continue to provide cash and kind in various sponsorship arrangements. Without their continuing ongoing support the Union would struggle, and it's important the current arrangements are maintained, and additional sponsors are secured. I would like to thank the current sponsors for their support, which is the lifeblood of the Union.

The Country Championships continue to be the showcase of the Union, with this year's event in the New England being a massive turnaround from the big wet the previous year. Armidale turned on magnificent weather, which saw the senior and colt teams respond by playing some outstanding Rugby, with the four finals being the highlight of the championships. Congratulations to Illawarra (Caldwell Cup) and Newcastle Hunter (Rowlands Colts Cup) for making it back to back wins, while Central West's big effort to take out both the Richardson Shield and Colts Shield will see both teams in the top division next year. Next year will see the Country Championship caravan travel to Port Macquarie, for what should be another fantastic event, which will feature a Women's Sevens Championship.

Not to be outdone, the Women's Championships in Tamworth were the best on record, with a record number of zones participating, which saw a record number of players take to the field. The standard of play was high, which provided stiff competition, and it was Hunter's experience which saw them retain their title.

Our representative programs had some highs and lows, but the important thing is that players are now seeing Country Rugby as a pathway, which has the potential to provide opportunities down the track. The relationship with the NSW Waratahs Academy Programs has been strengthened, and I would like to thank Tim Rapp from the NSW Waratahs for his support of Country Rugby. I would also like to thank the Coaches, Managers and Support Staff of the three representative teams, as their commitment and professionalism is first rate.

Cockatoos again had the opportunity to test themselves against the Australian U20's, a match which the players relish, even though they end up on the wrong side of the score-line. The Brumbies Provincial XV were blown away, while the "Maher/Ross Cup" was reclaimed from NSW Suburban with a record winning score, but the "Battle of the Borders Cup" was relinquished to Queensland Country in a heart breaking last minute loss.

The Cockatoo Colts participated with mixed results in the pre-season Southern States Championships in Adelaide, but due to the circumstances beyond the Union's control, the latter part of the season had to be shelved. Planning is well advanced to ensure a program is in place for 2017, and with the change to U19's, ACT, Queensland Country and NSW Waratahs will provide strong opposition. I would like to thank the Colts Coaching and Management for their understanding, in what was a disappointing set of circumstances.

On the back of a strong championships the Corellas were able to select a new look squad, which saw the team and several individuals enjoy a very successful season. Strong results against Sydney and at the Southern States Championships set the team up for the National Championships, at which they had to compete in the "Pool of Death". Everyone took notice when an historic win was achieved over Queensland, and it was on a countback that the team was placed in the Plate Final instead of the Championship Final. They went on to take out the Plate Final for the second time in three years, while Alana Patison and Sarah Riordan were selected in the Wallaroos Training Squad, before going on to earn two International Caps against New Zealand. Since then Kate Gilbert has been added to the Wallaroos Training Squad, and is now in contention for selection in the Wallaroos Team for next year's Rugby World Cup in Ireland.

I would again like to thank and congratulate the NSW Country Rugby Union Board for the direction they are giving the Union. This Board under the presidency of Barry Ruddy has been together for several years, and during this time they have been able to place the Union in a strong position. I would like to acknowledge outgoing director Paul Verrell for his efforts during his time on the Board, and wish him every success as coach of the Wallaroos.

Next season again holds a lot of uncertainties, but I'm sure those associated with the administration of the "Game in the Bush" will again rise to meet these uncertainties and challenges, as has been the case over many years.

Once again we have had a successful year of rugby both at zone championship and representative levels.

After trying some changes on how we ran the Country Championships for older ages last year, we have reverted to running these events exclusively as Country events. We held the country championships, U12's to U18's, over three consecutive weekends.

The first event was held on the Central Coast at Ourimbah for the U17's & U18's. U17's was taken out by Hunter, while the U18's was won by a very good Central Coast team. Thanks again to Gary Head and the Ourimbah club for hosting a very successful carnival.

The next weekend, we journeyed to Lismore for the under U12's, U13's and U14's. I have been to Lismore on a number of occasions for rugby events and they are always run very well with first class facilities. We were fortunate enough to have the mayor of Lismore, Jenny Dowell, attend the carnival and she presented the winning teams with their medals. U12's was won by Hunter, U13's saw joint champions with

Central West and Hunter unable to be separated, and the U14's was won by Hunter. Congratulations to the Hunter on a very good performance in all these age groups.

The final weekend of the championships was held at Scone for the U15's & U16's. Thanks to Michelle Edwards for organising such a successful event. U15's was won by Central West and U16's was won by Central Coast.

After these championships country representative teams were selected. I would like to thank the selectors from the various age groups, they did a very professional job which often goes unrecognised. Teams were selected for U14's, U17's and U18's, together with squads of 40 for U15's & U16's which competed as two teams at the regionals, and then the teams was narrowed down to a playing group of 23.

We continue to work hard on providing meaningful representative games for our various age groups. We played both ACT and Sydney in all age groups. Both these fixtures offer us very competitive games and help to develop players to experience rugby at the next level. We also had a fixture against CHS for U16's & U17's, while the planned U18's fixture being washed out. We have developed a good relationship with CHS and it is planned to hold this event again next year.

The U17's and U18's toured Western Australia, where they won all games, although the game against WA for the under 18's could have gone either way. It was played in driving rain as the curtain raiser for the Western Force game. This was a good opportunity to experience how a professional game of super rugby is run first hand for the players. It was also good to have a number of ex country players who are playing for Western Force talk to the boys. They included Matt Hodgson who presented the jumpers before the game, Ben McCallman and Rory Walton who mingled with the players after the game. I sometimes think that the people who run professional rugby forget the significance of such occasions on young rugby players in being able to talk to these elite players. Let's hope we have more opportunities like this for all our junior players throughout NSW Country. I know the new CEO of NSW Rugby, Andrew Hore, is keen to see this happen, so I encourage zones to be proactive about trying to facilitate this.

The U18's played a midweek game against GPS at Hunter Hill. They were very competitive in this game and just lost. We are working with schools to enhance this age group and give our U18's the best possible opportunities at this level. While schools have a set program of representative rugby, a number of our players have left school, or are attending TAFE and don't have the same representative opportunities that school players do. Hopefully down the track we will have a state competition for all U18 players and not just players who attend school. It's an important age group and we need to offer these players every opportunity to play representative rugby.

Our U16's played at an Invitational Tournament during the September school holidays then toured NZ straight after. From all accounts it was a very enjoyable tour with three very tough games against Auckland provincial sides.

A sevens carnival was held at Coffs Harbour this year. It was similar to the event held last year, but instead of just being a country event it was a state event with teams from Sydney competing. We had a number of our zones attending in U15's & U17's

for both boys and girls. Central North won the Boys U17's and a number of country players were asked to represent NSW at the Youth Nationals in WA later this year. As this area of the game progresses we need to look at how we can help it develop throughout our country zones.

I would like to thank all the coaches, managers and trainers from all the age groups. They give freely of their time and expertise to further develop young players at a representative level. Your efforts are really appreciated by our board and me.

This year we had support and sponsorship from Victor Sports, Spartan, NSW Country Rugby and NSW Rugby. We really appreciate their support which helps promote and give players the opportunity to play at representative level. Playing representative rugby for NSW Country Juniors is a costly exercise for players and parents to participate, your help and assistance helps reduce the costs to each player, so thanks again.

I would like to congratulate all players who represented their zones, and either NSW Country Juniors or NSW Juniors. It is a great achievement and hopefully you have made lifelong friends, as well as, had some great experiences. None of this could happen without the help and support of all the parents and volunteers. Without your assistance in getting players to events it would not happen.

I finally think the hierarchy of rugby is getting the message that the grassroots of rugby is important. I don't think we want much, just recognition that we exist at a junior level. The reality is that their elite players come from junior ranks so they ignore us at their peril.

Next year there have been changes made to junior gold with the competition now being based around U15's and U16's. The U15's will be run as 10 teams from throughout Australia. NSW country will be one of those teams, there will no longer be country zones playing. We will play in the NSW draw which at this stage hasn't been clearly defined. My understanding is that there will be games over three weekends mid to late September, with the NSW pool winner playing the Queensland pool winner late in September. We are still waiting for complete clarification of this, but I think it is a good move as players won't be expected to play rugby 12 months of the year.

The U16's age groups is moving back to a national event to be held over the last week of September. We will not have a team in this event, as it's planned to have two NSW sides. At this stage it is planned to continue with the regionals in the first weekend of the July school holidays, and on the last week we will play Sydney Juniors and NSW Schools, from which the two NSW sides will be selected to compete in Queensland. We are meeting with Tim Rapp from NSWRU, so hopefully we will be able to clarify this a little more moving forward.

I would like to thank my committee for all their help throughout the year. We could not run our events without everyone pitching in and giving their help. I would thank Mick Sutherland who is our secretary, he does an enormous amount of work for our organisation and it wouldn't be nearly as successful as it is without you. Our treasurer Stuart Burke is standing down this year. Stuart has done a great job under difficult

circumstances. He has had criticism from other organisations but as far as I'm concerned Stuart you have done a great job. I think some of these people who have criticised us fail to realise that we are all volunteers and do this for the benefit of the game not ourselves. I have valued your input and your options while we have worked together and I hope you still find time to express your ideas to me and future country boards.

I hope you all have an enjoyable and successful 2017. We are here to work with you to improve rugby for all juniors, male and female, throughout Country NSW.

2016 was a season of consolidation and growth for the CRURA.

The rugby season started in February and finished late October. CRURA sent two referees and a coach to the Darwin 7's. The Junior Gold Cup ran during February and March where CRURA appointed to many of the U15 and U17 matches. Our referees were at the National Women's 7's and Women's National Championships, together with being at the NSW State Championships and Country Junior's Championships.

Our coaches attended the National Women's Championships, and the season finished up with referees and coaches at the Central Coast 7s. One of our referees has been invited by the ARU to the Dubai 7's as a Referee Coach, with three referees invited to the Darwin 7's in January 2017. This reflects the sound working relationship and recognition CRURA has established with the ARU and NSWRU.

Our focus in 2016 continued with referee coach development. We had several new coaches invited to assist at Country Carnivals throughout the year and continued our referee mentor program at the Country Championships to facilitate referee feedback on coaches to the Chairman of the CGB.

The Armidale School Primary Schools carnival continued to be our major referee development tool with young referees from Country, Sydney and TAS officiating supported by our coaches. This is a tremendous tournament and of huge value to CRURA.

The limited Country Representative Program was a disappointment from the referees' perspective with only one senior match available at which to officiate. The State Junior championships continue to be an opportunity for our developing referees to gain recognition on a broader base. Our thanks to NSW Juniors for the opportunity. These Championships are however expensive and NSW is again slow in providing assistance.

We may need to reassess our objectives in 2017 with the Caldwell Cup and Richardson Shield the only senior competitions. All other events are either Women's or U19 Laws. With limited Junior Gold Cup commitments late in the season, we will also have a reduced demand early in the year.

Unfortunately we lost our major sponsor University of New England at the start of the year, leaving a hole in our finances. Our other sponsors Protective Fencing, and Orica Mining Services have again supported us in 2016. Additional sponsorship proposals are currently under discussion. Our Bank account is sound and our budget for 2017 will need some trimming. Our cash situation early in the season will be limited until our grant monies become available from Country Juniors, Country Seniors and NSW.

I would take this opportunity to acknowledge the support of Terry Woodward from NSW Country. Again thanks to our Registrar Mike Lyons and Ian Richardson our CGB Chairman. A mention to Darrell Jones who stepped in as Secretary early in the year after Fred Boog's unexpected resignation. All these gentlemen have combined to make 2016 another successful year for the CRURA.

This year the representative team played seven (7) matches, with four of these being played at National Championships. The rugby scene for Women is undergoing much change at present where a huge emphasis is being given to 7's rugby.

The year began for Country with the Country Championships which were held in Tamworth on the 30th April. Hunter won the Championships and were deserved Champions for this year. However the inclusion of teams from Illawarra, Central North and New England was a huge bonus, and certainly made for tough matches for the traditionally strong NSW Country Women's rugby powers, Hunter and Central West. These Championships were one of the best for many years with an excellent sprinkling of players from all across NSW Country.

The selected representative team then played games during May and June in the lead up to the National Championships. They were defeated by Sydney in Newcastle, and at the Southern States Championships in Wagga Wagga, the team had a win over the Victoria and a loss to ACT. The team competed very well at the National Championships at Riverview, registering three wins and a loss, which included an historic win over Queensland. These results saw the team compete in the Plate Final, which they duly won. Alana Patison (prop) and Sarah Riordan (centre) were selected in the Wallaroos training squad after these National Women's Championships, and following on from the recent training camp they were selected in the Wallaroos Squad

that toured New Zealand. It should also be noted that NSW Country stalwarts, Paul Verrell (Coach) and Amanda Fergusson (Manager), are vital cogs in the Wallaroos.

Many thanks go to coaches Michael Burgess and Murray Hooper for their efforts with this team. They did a wonderful job in the development of this team over the year. Thanks also to Pam Thomson and Tammy Clay, who did a wonderful job as Team Managers.

7's rugby also became a potent force in women's rugby in recent years. Its importance has been increasing but this year it definitely made its mark. NSW competes at the Nationals 7's as a state team, and several NSW Country players were selected in the NSW teams that competed at these Nationals.

Many thanks to the delegates from each of the Zones, your commitment is not easy as you are all so busy trying to ensure Women's rugby continues in your own area as well as at the representative level.

Many thanks to the Board of the NSW Country Rugby Union for your moral and financial support. I would like to thank the Executive Officer Terry Woodward for his continued support of Women's rugby and for the help and advice. Thanks also to the NSW Country sponsors, your support is gratefully accepted. It has been a good year, and already planning has commenced for 2017.

3. At the time of writing this, Kyle Godwin had just made his Wallabies debut, taking the total to 3 Wallabies Debut for Country Eagles players this season. Congratulations to Tom Robertson, Tolu Latu and Kyle Godwin for achieving the highest honor possible in our game.

No silverware this year for our representative teams but the seniors managed to claw its way up a point in the Caldwell Cup rankings. Unfortunately it was the reverse for the 20's being relegated to the bottom tier.

The Women's XV acquitted themselves well at the Country Championships held at Tamworth earlier in the year, and with the increasing interest in Women's rugby we look forward to participating in the in the 2017 Country Championships in Foster.

Plenty of drama early in the season when forfeits were the order of the day, however all Clubs worked hard to put two senior teams on the paddock each week and in the main were successful. There is work to be done to improve our Colts program. All Clubs are facing challenges with a diminishing participation rates, competition from other sports and the diminishing player base in the smaller rural towns.

Congratulations to the Magpies in hosting the NSW Country Eagles in round three of the National Championships. A great day with the usual fast, furious and thrilling NRC style of rugby. This year the Eagles called Tamworth home for the NRC Final against the Perth Spirit. Played at the brilliant Scully Park Stadium in Tamworth the Spirit clipped the wings of the eagles to win a close game.

All Clubs and affiliates worked well as a team throughout the year and as one is looking ahead to advance rugby in Central North. The Vision 2020 planning day held post competition consolidated many views into a number of strategies to take us through the next four years and beyond.

Thanks to the referees for again making our game possible and they were always up to any challenge we could throw at them. The Zone looks forward to a developing relationship with the CNRRA through 2017. As a Zone we need to work closely with CNRRA to improve recruitment and retention of referees

So, the two tier structure; how did it go? Central North does not enjoy the luxury of enough Clubs to have a permanent two division competition but the arrangement this year provided an opportunity for any one of the top 6 Clubs to have a second crack at the silverware. Both Quirindi first grade and Barraba reserve grade proved this to be so with Quirindi coming through the second Tier undefeated only to go down in a close elimination final against 3rd placed Moree while the Barraba Reserve Grade came from left field to win a place in the final 4 eliminating the favoured Magpies along the way only to lose out in the Reserve Grade preliminary final.

Quirindi also celebrated 60 years of continuing rugby and the marked turnaround in its playing fortunes was a deserved birthday present.

This report bears a grievance about the accounting process relating to the National Participation Fees. The current process is messy and hard to manage involving Zone and Club personnel in working with a flawed method of accounting. Rather than go into the details, Central North is of the view that subject to the appropriate training, the full functionality of Rugbylink should be applied for the purposes of the registering and payment of the NPF.

The ARU has indicated that it is rolling out a number of Workshops around the country and has indicated that it will be in the Central North area in February next year. Central North will take this opportunity to train up Clubs to be able to complete the registration and fee payment on-line and other useful functions available or able to be activated. Central North does not waver from its support of the NPF as it is seen as the only way to keep rugby in Australia viable. Having said that, a rundown on the system since introduced would be useful in terms of knowing how much, how was it distributed and who got what? Some comparative statistical data would be also be useful e.g. changes in participation rates.

On closing could I thank NSW Country for its support of Country Rugby and I thank Terry Woodward for being accessible and obliging when assistance was required.

Central West Rugby Union has had a very successful 2016 season in both domestic competitions and representative Rugby and as a Zone we continue to have the 2nd largest number of registered players in NSW Country Rugby (NSWCRU) in both juniors & seniors.

Wet weather and availability of venues played a major role in our competitions this year and all Clubs are to be congratulated on their patience, their ability to

compromise and their willingness to ensure that wherever possible games went ahead sometimes at alternative playing venues.

With the introduction by the ARU of their Rugby-Link Registration and Competition Manager system and the complexities of implementing and utilization of this system at a Club level, CWRU held an Education Day at CSU Orange in February. Presented by ARU personnel, the Club Registers and officials who attended were able to obtain the skills necessary to operate this system to the benefit of their Club. Also included on the day was a session on Club Administration skills and a Refereeing in Practice session.

Plans are underway to hold an expanded Rugby Education Day on February 18th 2017.

The Blowes Clothing Cup Competition saw the age limit for Colts (in line with NSWCRU) lowered to U/19 with nine clubs fielding teams in a keenly contested competition. The Colts Grand Final was won by Bathurst Bulldogs 15 over CSU Bathurst 9.

Orange Emus won back to back 1st Grade Grand Final with a 14-11 win over Forbes. The match was played on a very heavy field and was decided with a penalty goal to Emus out wide in the 80th minute. The 2nd grade Grand Final was won by Dubbo Kangaroos 21 to Emus 17. Dubbo Kangaroos also won the 3rd grade Grand Final defeating Bathurst Bulldogs 24-21.

In the 15 aside Women's competition the Grand Final was contested by Cowra and new comers Mudgee in their first season. Cowra won 22-7.

We welcomed two new Clubs, Temora and Cootamundra to participate in the GrainCorp Cup. In addition these two Clubs plus West Wyalong and Grenfell played a 7's Women's Competition which was keenly contested and ultimately won by Temora 29 over West Wyalong 24.

To accommodate Temora and Cootamundra the GrainCorp Cup Competitions were played in three conferences of five Club home and away for rounds 1- 10.

Following the completion of these rounds the Clubs from the central division (Blayney, Canowindra, Molong, CSU Orange and Yeoval) were combined with the northern and southern divisions.

The Grand Final winner in the northern competition was Trangie with a strong second half performance to defeat Molong 24-7.

The Grand Final Winner in the southern competition with back to back Grand Final wins was Blayney over Cootamundra 31 - 12.

In representative rugby Central West Rugby Union had a most successful season. Preparations commenced in February and continued through March and April with a steady build up to the NSWCRU Championships at Armidale in May.

The Blue Bulls played two matches on day one of the Championships securing wins over Mid North Coast (MNCRU) and Far North Coast (FNCRU) to progress to the

final of the Richardson Shield. CWRU played New England (NERU) for the Richardson Shield with CWRU winning 68-12.

The Colts played Mid North Coast (MNCRU) on day one with CWRU progressing to the Final with a 29 to 14 win. In the NRMA Colts Shield CWRU defeated Illawarra District (IDRU) 25 – 22 in a most entertaining game.

My thanks to the representative team staff for their efforts throughout the season. Both teams achieved their goal of winning their respective competitions and progressing to the Caldwell Cup and Rowlands Colts Cup Competitions in 2017.

CWRU continues to have the benefit of a well-organised and pro-active Referees Association. Our referees continue to unfailingly donate their time and expertise, without which we simply would not flourish. CWRU continues its involvement with our referees to implement procedures which further increase the number and participation rate of referees within our zone, and to provide an enjoyable experience and further training opportunities for both new and established referees.

The 2016 FNCRU season was a season of great contrast, the quality of rugby played at odds with some troubling issues off the pitch.

Firstly, congratulations must go to this seasons Premiership winning teams; Wollongbar – Alstonville going back to back; Mullumbimby capping a fine season

with a fine victory; and Iluka winning a maiden title but also overcoming challenging circumstances in President's Cup.

It would be unfair not to also congratulate the other clubs who contested the grand finals this year: Evans River, Ballina and Byron Bay. Congratulations on not only reaching the grand final but on combining with the other clubs to draw one of the biggest grand final crowds in recent years.

On field matters aside, there have been good parts and bad to this past season. The main bad part in my opinion is the continuing absence of an Under 17, 18 or 19 competitions. This matter is very troubling for the future of senior rugby. There seems, from the responses received, a real reluctance by many clubs within the Zone to participate in any board generated initiative to attempt to halt or reverse the departure of teenagers from our game.

I must commend board members Kelvin Langfield and Jeffrey Brooks for their efforts in addressing this problem, efforts that have so far gone without reward or, very sadly, any tangible success. There is still hope that Jeffrey's Secondary School Competition comes to fruition and reaps some reward, an initiative that I really hope that clubs will take the time to get involved in. Not to labour the point, but the attraction and retention of young players cannot be solved by emails and pieces of paper coming from the board. Only the clubs have the community contacts and people power required to turn the issue around. I am sure whomever is part of the FNCRU Board next season will be willing to support any effort to get kids playing rugby and keep them playing.

As far as the Board itself goes, I think it is reasonable to say that there has been a lot of frustration, not only within the Board, but with the performance of the Board as well.

Having been a board member in both the old "Small Board" and the new "Big Board" formats, I can say without doubt that the "Big Board" model does not work. The Big Board could be as inefficient as it could be ineffective, often with inconsistency in attendance leading to the frustration of the Board members and great wasting of the hours those members had to devote to rugby. The big Board has also seen a very disappointing amount of partisan "club first" attitudes and some cases of people being elected to the Board with no intention of making any contribution at all. I think it's fair to say that the clubs have largely become more professional in how they govern their internal affairs. Now the time has come for the FNCRU Board to become more professional in its format and function too.

Having now had my say, I will offer my thanks to the members of the Board for their patience. Many of the meetings were long, often dull and sometimes completely fruitless.

I will also congratulate the Mullumbimby and Byron Bay Rugby Clubs for taking the longer term view of the situation that was put to them this season. I found their attitude very refreshing and a prime example for others.

Lastly, I will say thank you on behalf of the Board to our long suffering Zone Administrator Wayne Millane. Wayne does a huge amount of work for the Zone, most of it over and above the official scope of his position, and often without regard

to the time of day (or night) or day of the week. How Mrs Millane has put up with it so long I'll never know.

It is with great pleasure that I can advise you that the 2016 season has been a most successful one in the Illawarra for both seniors and juniors.

First success was of course the winning of the Caldwell Cup in the Senior Country Division for the second time in a row and a most improved Colts. The reason for this was that this season it was decided that both the Colts and the Seniors would train together and would work on a pattern of play that was identical. This meant that if players were needed to play up a higher grade they knew what was required of them. It also meant that there was far more intense competition at training as the Colts challenged the senior players and vice versa. This encouraged a greater feeling of the Illawarra sides being in this together and not being separate identities.

Second achievement was the strengthening of our competition, the standard of rugby has been raised and that there were a number of teams vying for semi-final positions. Whereas before there were the usual two or three who could take out the trophy, it now meant that there were five or six teams that were viable and overall the senior grade competition was very competitive. This also filtered down into the lower grades.

The zone has also received applications from two clubs, one a new club and the other a club that was playing in Sub-Districts to come back to play in the Illawarra competition. Their view is to commence in Third grade and grow their player base so that they would, within a period of five years, be looking at fielding teams in the First, Seconds, Thirds and Colts. The very pleasing factor is of course that they both wish to field junior sides in the 2017 competition in some age-groups.

The result of the Senior competition was that the Wollongong University triumphed over Woonona Shamrocks in extra time. The Second grade competition was won by Campbelltown by one point over Shamrocks with a penalty goal 40 metres out from the sideline in a swirling wind, and in Third grade the Vikings Rugby Club defeated Vincentia with a try in the last seven minutes. The day was an immense success and credit must be given to the Woonona Shamrocks as they participated in the First and Second Grade finals and were the overall Club Champions for 2016. This was a tremendous turn-around from being in the doldrums the previous year.

Season 2016 was again a challenging year for the Newcastle & Hunter Rugby Union.

Many of the decisions made by the NHRU Board during the season were unanimous and followed recommendations by the General Manager. As a result of these decisions the Board has set the platform for change and development of rugby in the Newcastle and Hunter Zone. This change will continue over the next few years.

The NHRU's decision to sanction to an U19 competition following the lead of the NSW Country Rugby Union and coinciding with the Hunter Junior Rugby Union (HJRU) move to an Under 17s competition, was challenged by some clubs. The U19 competition eventually proceeded with the NHRU being vindicated in this decision with the 2017 competition including an U19 competition with an increased number of teams over 2016.

NHRU introduced new By-Laws for season 2016 which were enforced from Round 1, much to the consternation of some clubs. These By-Laws require minor amendment however are modern, easy to understand and should serve the Union well for the medium to long term. The Player Points System continues to evolve and should assist to deliver a more even competition over the next few years and the continued development of junior rugby.

The Premier competition remained a ten club competition with the re-admission of Lake Macquarie to Premier. Hamilton won the Premier 1 Grand Final, for a second straight year, defeating Wanderers. Merewether- Carlton won 2nd Grade, 3rd Grade saw joint Premiers in Merewether- Carlton and Maitland. Merewether- Carlton were Premiers in the inaugural U19 competition. In a new initiative, a "Social 4s" competition was introduced with Wanderers being the initial Premiers. Michael Delore from Southern Beaches was a worthy winner of the Viatek Anderson Medal, again presented at the Grand Final.

In Divisional Rugby Cooks Hill won both the Presidents and Patrons competitions. Participating clubs overwhelmingly enjoyed the competitive nature and structure of this year's Divisional competitions.

Again the NHRU financially controlled both the Premier and Divisional finals series. This was a decision based on the need to improve the NHRU's financial situation. This decision has "borne fruit" for the NHRU as we have returned to break-even within two years of posting a \$38,000 deficit.

NHRU's Senior and Colt's representative sides travelled to Armidale for the Country Championships. Unfortunately, the senior side was defeated in the final whilst the Colts won their competition. Thank you to coaches Tony Munro and Stu Pinkerton, their respective managers and personnel for their hard work. NHRU also fielded a Barbarians team against a Country Barbarian side prior to the NRC game in Newcastle.

Once again the NHRU promoted rugby within the Hunter region by hosting a National Rugby Championship semi-final in Newcastle. NSW Country Eagles played Melbourne Rising on 15 October, at which a good sized crowd saw the Eagles advance to the NRC final.

On the weekend of 6 & 7 November the NHRU, in conjunction with The Hawthorne Club, hosted the NSW U20s 7 a side tournament, with Warringah winning the men's competition and Waverley the women's. This tournament, and the NRC game, are excellent vehicles to promote our code in the Hunter.

NHRU launched a new website earlier in the year and produced a digitalised weekly Rugby News Program. Our relationship with The Hawthorne Club has returned to one that is of mutual benefit and looking to jointly foster Rugby in the region.

A new major sponsor for the next three years was also "signed up": RAMS. Thank you to RAMS and our other sponsors: NIB, Tooheys, Viatek, The Hawthorne Club and the Delaney Hotel. Our coverage of Premier games continued with Bar TV and this coverage was extended with the introduction of the weekly "Ruck-Off" show which discussed the main rugby issues during the week. TopBetta was a major sponsor of this coverage.

NHRU Board and competitions continue to transition with more changes likely over the next few years. In order to assist this transition and as a guide for the future, the NHRU held two themed General Meetings with the clubs covering the Player Points System and future competitions. The results of these two meetings will be ongoing. NHRU continues to face challenges which have to be addressed: financial security and increased levels of sponsorship, enabling the building of our reserves so that we can promote and develop the game; continuing to increase the use of volunteers; enhanced usage of social media; and ensuring we provide flexible competitions in which players want to participate. The issue of a new lease for No. 2 Sports Ground, the "Home of Rugby", should be resolved within the next few months.

With many of the difficult issues dealt with or being dealt with, hopefully the new Board will have some clear air to consider the "big picture" issues for the development of and promotion of rugby involving the HJRU, Women's, Referees and The Hawthorne Club in a co-operative spirit.

My thanks you to a hard working Board who are all volunteers, especially to Stan McManus and Bob Brenton for their tireless work during the finals series. My biggest thank you goes to General Manager Andy Fairfull for his work and vision, which will ensure the NHRU continues to move forward into the future.

I wish the new President and Board all the best for the future.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY

The principal continuing activity of the company during the financial year is the administration and fostering of the game of Rugby Union in the state of New South Wales outside the Country of Cumberland.

There has been no significant change in the nature of that activity during the year.

RESULTS

The net result of operations for the financial year was a deficit of \$617 (2015 surplus of \$59,256). No provision for Income Tax has been made as the Company is a non-profit sporting body and exempt from Income Tax.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT CONTINUED

REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

There was a variation in the operating revenue and operating expenditure between 2015 and 2016.

Income was down on the previous year due to the loss/reduction of Sponsorship (NRMA & QantasLink). There were variances with Affiliation Fees, Bank Interest, Country Championships & Sundry Income, while AGL was secured as a Sponsor.

NSWRU Funding remained the same as 2015, while there was an increase in Representative Team expenses, which was slightly offset by the cancellation of the latter part of the Cockatoos Colts program. Sponsorship Servicing was reduced due to the loss of NRMA, while Administration expenses increased due to the registration of the Union's intellectual property for the next ten years. Contra sponsorship items are included as income and expenditure items.

Contra sponsorship income has been reported inclusive of GST. It will have the effect of overstating the net value of the sponsorship income and matching contra expense by the GST component. This will have no effect on the net operating profit or GST reporting as effectively the amounts are equal in value.

The company's operations are not regulated by any significant environment regulation under a law of the Commonwealth or of a State or Territory.

DIRECTOR'S BENEFIT
